BURIED YET DELIVERED

—Buried Letter

We get a lot of mail at Grace. Catalogs, flyers, and solicitations run the gamut of church and school interests. Most of the stuff is immediately discarded. There simply is no practical way to read every piece of “junk” mail.

Yesterday as I rifled through one stack a first-class envelope slipped out from inside a piece of junk mail on the way to the waste basket. The return address said it was from a doctor way over on the west side of Michigan sent to somebody— *in Cleveland!* It was evidently important. Through the envelope I could faintly see documents and maybe a check.

I’m guessing this valuable correspondence slipped inside the folds of the “junk mail” during handling. How easily it could have been thrown out with no one the wiser, causing puzzlement at best or harm at worst.

The doctor’s office would think the letter sent. Suspicion might fall on somebody for negligence. Certainly the recipient would be inconvenienced. Maybe worse.

I put it back in the mail.

So many junk messages interfere with the Gospel. So much noise from the world gets in the way. Opening day for Detroit Tiger baseball this year falls on Good Friday. Do you think major league baseball will alter its schedule and marketing so fans can be in worship?

The suggestion is laughable. Even if they did, attention isn’t going to shift to what is sacred. Too many other signals and priorities jostle for notice. Too many other affairs get in the way. The Gospel gets bumped and covered by junk.

That’s not new. It happened at Jerusalem the first Good Friday. Jesus stood before Pontius Pilate and made no

reply to the charges against him. Anything He might say would be buried in an avalanche of trash talk. Earlier that day, the Bible says, “Jesus remained silent” in front of the high priest.

His silence was not absolute because, when charged to declare under oath whether he was the Christ, Jesus answered, “Yes....”

Alas, no one really listened. They only rose up with greater indignation, indictments of blasphemy, and calls for Jesus’ death. The most significant declaration in history was buried like a dead letter in the dumpster.

The Word of life died in the crucifixion of Jesus. His death was not a slip-up like some errant piece of mail but the catastrophe of God Himself silenced.

Why is that so tragic? A silent God means no forgiveness of sin is declared. A silent God means hopeless ignorance and confusion for mankind. The Gospel bottled up prevents saving faith in Christ, because without God’s Word how could we even know Him? A silent God is a terrible God. And to shut up His Word is ruinous. But that is what our sin did to Him.

With the buried body of Jesus was buried His voice, His teachings, His comfort, and the power of God’s truth. The word of His grace is gagged whenever someone refuses to hear it. If we find His Word inconvenient, we smothered its joy and quash the message of hope and peace.

I said before that I thought I saw a check in that doctor’s envelope on my desk. Though surrounded by reams of other worthless paper, here was something of real value .

What people couldn’t see when Jesus was crucified and buried was the payment of inestimable value sealed inside His body.

Hidden in Christ’s pain and suffering

was indemnity for the sin of the world. The cost of sin which should have been borne by us was instead being carried in Jesus’ breakable body nailed to a cross.

He was charged and punished for our noisy clamor against the truth. He was incriminated for our rebellion against God and sins against others. Christ pays for our deafness to His Word.

Buried inside him were our offenses, our infirmities, and our sorrows. We were willing to discard Him. We were in the process of throwing him out.

But even when overwhelmed by our junk and rubbish He would not let His promises be lost. From the reeking landfill of Calvary, His Word is still spoken.

Despite invectives hurled against Him, Jesus prayed, “Father, forgive them.” He would not leave us without His word of love. He paid the price and buried our sin in his own flesh.

God went silent for three dreadful days. The seam was torn and God’s own Word smothered. Yet that fragile sachet of a man would come to us again.

The tomb, like a rare, revealing manuscript, or like a precious envelope carrying a king’s declaration of pardon was opened, and the greatest message ever told was declared.

He is risen! Christ is risen from the dead. Hope is not lost. Jesus is alive once more. Life is restored.

Write someone a letter and tell them. Post IMs and “tweet” your friends on Facebook. Compose new songs. Tell the world. Be in touch with your neighbors, and drop a line wherever you can that Christ lives! Our sin is buried forever.

God has spoken, written— and delivered!. Alleluia!

Gadget's Garage is the coolest place for kids of all ages to hang out this summer.

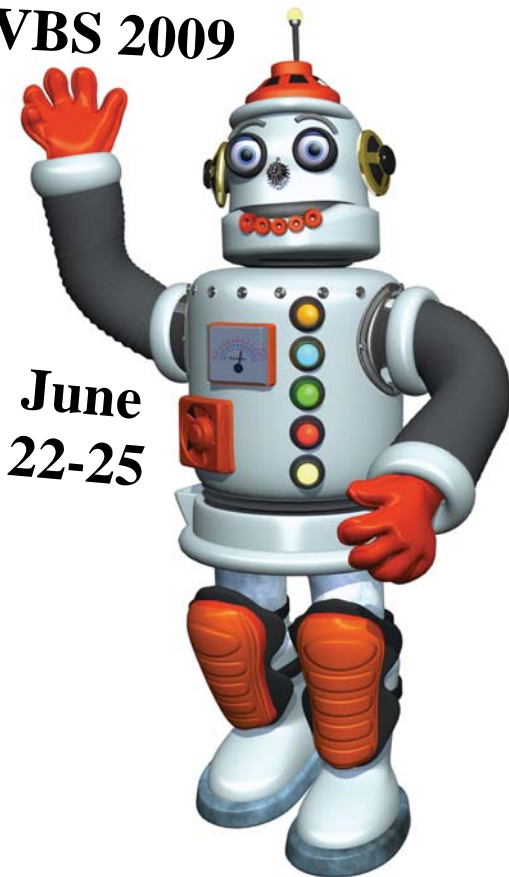

"WINNING OVER THE WHINES"

Don't we all love the sound of the whining child? That melodious call wafting over the kitchen, endlessly repeating until the request is met or nap time begins. Somehow I don't think that thirty years from now, when you have gathered all your children together for a family reunion, you will be fondly reminiscing about the whines. You might, however, have a small smile upon hearing a repeat of the same whines from your grandchildren.

Whining is annoying and frustrating and irritating and contagious and habit-forming and tiresome and now I am starting to whine. Children whine for many different reasons, but the basic skill that can prevent whining is called self-regulation. It is a skill that develops over a lifetime. Self-regulation has to do with paying attention, keeping your hands to yourself, planning ahead, and many other skills, but it is also about learning how to cope and developing a confidence that problems can be solved.

In spite of the fact that whining is painfully noticeable to parents and other adults, children are not necessarily aware that they are whining. They simply default to a previously successful method to get what they want or need. When children whine, they are focused on what they want, not on how they are attempting to get it. You need to consistently stop whining when it happens and point it out then. For younger children it works well to request that they repeat themselves in a normal voice. For older children who roll their eyes when they have the obvious pointed out, ask them to submit their request in writing.

Children whine for attention and out of frustration. They are also more likely to whine when they are tired. Toddler whining should be a ticket for a nap, usually protested by vigorous eye-rubbing and the phrase, "But I not tired!" But, children past the napping stage need adequate amounts of sleep too. Persistent whining, especially when it happens around the same time every day, may indicate that your child is not getting enough rest. Pay attention, also, to your child's diet and the amount of outdoor play time. Too much sugar can affect

your child's mood and children need movement to keep from feeling tired and listless.

Frustration is another major reason for whining. Each child has his or her own temperament and this decides to a great degree how he or she handles stress. While it is not likely that you will be able to teach your child how to be more "laid-back", all children can and should learn how to cope with frustrations and stress. They should be taught what not to do. Whining is a natural reaction, but we need to point out to children that whining does not improve the situation. It actually makes the situation worse because whining makes them feel bad and makes others less likely to help.

As parents, we are the primary teachers for our children in the areas of verbal, problem solving, and coping skills. When a child has developed in these three areas, he or she no longer needs to whine. Replace your child's whining phrases with appropriate words and give them words for their feelings. Let your child know when they are feeling tired or jealous or frustrated. Identifying feelings and learning to use gelling words is important to emotional health. Children get frustrated when they cannot see a solution to their problem. Help your child to learn to calm down and assess the situation. Ask questions that help them to think through things and brainstorm possible solutions. They will gradually learn how to do this on their own and to seek help. This helps to develop self-confidence. Babies have favorite blankets or pacifiers to self-soothe, but we all need a way to calm down and cope with what life throws at us. Some children need to learn the difference between tragedy and a frustration. They will benefit from parents telling them "I can see you're frustrated (or angry, or jealous) but this is not a tragedy. They need to be told how to deal with the situation. You can see how important the verbal and problem solving skills are to coping skills.

The faith factor is also very important. When we whine, we forget about the heart of gratitude with which God has blessed us. Our faith reminds us that God loves us, no matter what. God loves us when we feel great and things are going our way. He also loves us when we feel like the world is against us! Whining and complaining covers up the gratitude that determines our attitude toward our life situation. Model gratitude for your children and look for opportunities to point our God's love for them.

We are all experiencing tough economic times. Your School Board recognizes this and as a result, next year's registration fees will actually be reduced! Our Open House/Early Registration will be April 21 in the evening. **Anyone that registers their child(ren) in April and pays a \$100.00 deposit, will only have reduced registration fees of \$270.00, a savings of \$25.00 per student.** Later registration will pay the same fee as this year, \$295.00. Any new students that are non-member of Grace Congregation are encouraged to register as well and for next year, will only have to pay half of the regular tuition fees. Our goal is to get new faces in our school. We are convinced that once they enroll and become a part of our school family, they will stay. All members of Grace Congregation have no tuition, and support the work of the school through their regular Sunday offerings.

Achievement testing for all of our students will be the week March 23 – 27. Please make efforts to insure that your child does the best. Make sure that your children get plenty of sleep, receive a balanced breakfast and lunch, and receive a lot of encouragement and praise for jobs well done. We are administering the tests a little earlier this year for two reasons. The week of April 6 is Holy Week, with Good Friday off, and the following week, Holy Monday is also off and we need an entire week for testing. Also, we want to have the results available before the end of the year, and an earlier testing period will make that possible. As soon as results are available, parents will receive a copy of their child's tests.

JUNIOR HIGH HIGHLIGHTS

Israel has entered the Promised Land and the twelve tribes have received their allocation of land. The nation of Israel repeatedly wanders from God's will. They will learn about the composition of ocean water, the interaction between the atmosphere and the oceans, and how waves, currents, and tides are created. The Constitution gave the federal government no definite power to regulate or end slavery where it already existed. Over the years both free and slave states had been added as a result of territorial growth. New land gains

strained the Union. The issue was whether the territories gained would be slave or free and whether the federal government or the states would decide. These challenges turned violent on the floor of the Senate and it fore-shadowed battlefields just a few years later. The graphing of ordered pairs, relations, and equations are challenging our eighth graders this month. By the end of the month, they will have solved problems by making a table, determined if a relation is a function, and will have written equations to express a relation.

We close out the 3rd marking period with the anticipation of the concluding school year. There has been a great deal of growth and learning that has taken place in Gator-land. The students have learned from each other as much as they have from me. I enjoy listening to them utilizing the social skills they have learned from the past, as well as tactics for problem-resolution as they seek to maintain unity rather than discord. It is a challenging age for them, and they are doing so well.

We are ready to move back into the science texts to finish the school year. We did not give up on our individual growing of seeds even though the soybeans were 'duds'. We have cucumbers, beets, and peas growing in a mini-greenhouse and they are really taking off. There is of course a competition for the fastest and tallest growth. We will continue to log them weekly in the journals. We will plan a stir-fry in a few weeks or so. (Beets, cucumbers, and peas? hmmm.)

The students are sitting in a new arrangement that we put together as a class-project. They submitted ideas, we categorized them according to practicality, and newness, and found who

could be with whom. The flow of the classroom has been smooth with fewer interruptions. It is important for them to feel a part of such decisions that impact them.

The students are getting spring-fever, so I wanted them to create a sculpture out of pom-pom balls that depicted those little creatures that may come out in the spring. They ranged from centipedes, to

birds, to little woodland creatures. I was very, very impressed with the detail and how they turned out.

As my first experience with the annual fish-fry, I was taken aback by all the hubbub Thursday and Friday. Mrs. Arnold's room was taken over as the prep-room; complete with plastic on the floor and the walls, and fish fillets everywhere! So many individuals were milling around doing so much preparation and set-up. I was astounded at the teamwork and coordination that it took to successfully pull this off. I was proud to be a part of it, and excited to experience it for the first time.

The 3rd and 4th graders are getting a very detailed study at the various waterways that connect our Great Lakes. We have moved from the New England States, to the Mid-Atlantic States. These boarder Michigan and are inclusive in the various canals and locks that populate our lakes. It is always a little more tangible when the students can identify with something from their own region.

As the good Lord brings forth new life in the spring, let us never forget the new life we have through Him as His

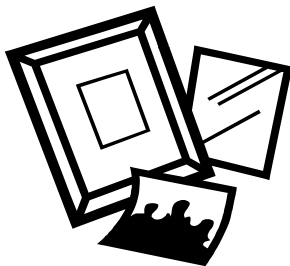


the study of fractions and more complex patterns. They are also learning how to count different coin amounts.

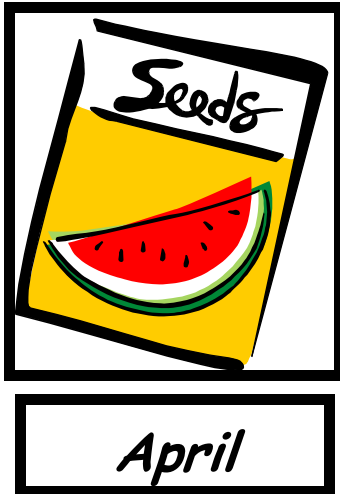
