SUPERB CELEBRATION BEGINS ANNIVERSARY

The 50th anniversary year of our congregation began magnificently with a united Divine Service, September 27th. Behind the cross entering God's house, we sang, "We praise You and acknowledge You, O God." How wonderful to hear such sound as the church came together for worship. We were blessed to have the choir of Bethlehem Lutheran Church as our guests.

Pastor Reed used James 1:12-18 as the basis for a sermon focusing upon the anniversary theme, "Grace—A Legacy of God's Love."

He said, "We have been God's children from our baptism, and we are His children still. We come to this day and these months being set apart to mark 50 years as a congregation no less needy of our Heavenly Father's grace and the blood-washed righteous of Christ than before. So, preach Law and Gospel. Expose sin and apply grace. Declare Christ crucified. That's what we've always been about. He is who we've always been about — Jesus of the blood and cross; Jesus of the crown and resurrection; Jesus of the fount and

chalice; the Messiah of the Old Testament and Christ of the New; Jesus of the Scriptures, creeds and Lutheran confessions— Son of God and Lord of Life. He is the only incentive for our rejoicing today or any day!"

The Lord's Supper and a final singing of "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less than Jesus' Blood and Righteousness" made the worship a great blessing to all.

A wonderful time of remembrance and encouragement followed the service as the congregation gathered for a delicious dinner and program at which our first principal, Dr. Leroy Laeder and former pastor, Rev. David Hakes, both spoke.

Our anniversary celebration continues with a second emphasis on Sunday, October 18, focusing upon the blessing of the Word and Sacrament ministry we have consistently received from our Lord these 50 years. The united Divine Service that day will again be held at 10:30 a.m.

Pastor Leroy Westphal, former pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, Beaver, will be guest preacher that day.

Does the Pastor Mean You?



Did you ever have suspicion the preacher meant you – the pastor aimed his remarks at you? If you have such a suspicion, you'd do well to ignore it. It is far more important to remember that your pastor means you every time he preaches. When he speaks of sin and warns against it, who else does he mean but you? He's not preaching of sins no one ever commits. When he speaks of indifference, he means you, for you are not

loving God with all your heart and

mind. When he speaks of love which you owe your neighbor, he means you. And when he teaches people are saved by grace, he means you, because that's the only way in which you can be saved.

Derive the most benefit from sermons by entering God's house with the thought, Today, Pastor is going to preach a sermon to me through which God wants to bless me.

There is real danger of failing to make a personal application of what you hear from the pulpit. There is danger to think little of those sins of which I myself am guilty. Poison does not change its nature because a king drinks it. Sin is just as damnable when you commit it as it is when someone else does.

If the pastor does not mean "you" when he preaches, why do you attend? I assume you don't go to hear what your pastor has to say to others. You don't go to a doctor, do you, in order to see how he treats other people? You go to him so that you yourself can receive treatment. You gather to worship so that God may speak to you. Each of us ought to say: I want my pastor to mean me in his sermons.

One will receive little benefit from time in worship if they go simply to observe or to listen to what a pastor has to say to others instead of hearing what God has to say to them themselves.

Luther remarked on this when he wrote the explanations of the Three Articles of the Apostles' Creed. Too many had repeated these articles in a general way, saying: "I believe that God created heaven and earth." But Luther gave the Creed a personal turn by writing: "I believe that God has made me and all creatures, that He has given me my body and soul," etc. Just so in the Second Article he wrote: "I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity," etc., "is my Lord, who has redeemed me."

Mere mental conviction concerning this or that fact of the Bible is not faith which saves. The faith which saves is faith which believes that God is speaking to me and what He says to me is true for me. This is the personal faith we see in St. Paul when he says: "I know whom I have believed, and I am convinced that he is able to guard until that Day what has been entrusted to me." 2 Tim. 1:12.

Rejoice, therefore, that when returning home from the Divine Service you may truthfully say, "Today me Pastor convicted me and – absolved me! My pastor, when he preached, meant me."

The Sixth Petition of The Lord's Prayer

And lead us not into temptation

Luther rightly reminds us that "God indeed tempts no one." We learn that in this petition we are praying "that God would guard and keep us, so that the devil, the world, and our flesh may not deceive us nor seduce us into misbelief, despair, and other great shame and vice; and though we be assailed by them, that still we may finally overcome and obtain the victory."

To put it into the affirmative, we are praying "Lead us out of temptation." It is not unlike in English saying, "I am not going in there alone!" That doesn't mean you're not going. It means you are going—but only along with someone else. So, likewise, "Lead us not into temptation" means "Lead us out of temptation."

This He does. Through St. Paul we have been promised: "No temptation has overtaken you except such as is common to man; but God is faithful, who will not allow you to be tempted beyond what you are able, but with the temptation will also make the way of escape, that you may be able to bear it."

Jesus teaches us to pray that our eyes would be open to the reality that we are being tempted, that we are in need of rescue, and that we would see the Divinely provided way of escape, which is of course His Word and Sacraments.

The reality of this fallen creation is that we are surrounded by death and temptation. Nonetheless, He has promised: "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand. My Father, who has given them to Me, is greater than all; and no one is able to snatch them out of My Father's hand."

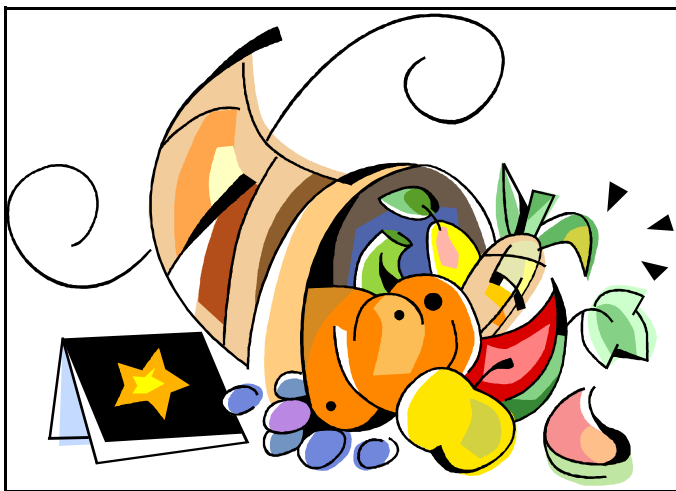

Productive Parent/Teacher Conferences

It seems like the school year just began, and yet, parent-teacher conferences loom just around the corner. When you read in the school memo that it is time to sign up for conferences, what kind of feelings come to the forefront?

Are you excited to meet with your child's teacher and hear how well he is doing, or do you dread finding out what his current "issues" are? Whether you expect conferences to give you something to brag or worry about, they are important and useful tools to insure that your child gets the most from his or her learning experience.

The key thing to remember during conferences is that a team is formed. Each team member has his own job and expertise. And while each member is important to the team, the team is useless without the work of God. Your child's team includes the parents (who know the most about their child and what is happening at home), the teacher (who knows the most about how children learn and what's happening in the classroom), and your child (who knows what is happening from his or her own perspective.) Because your child is attending Grace, a Christ-centered school, the team also includes God. Even though each team member has a different perspective, all members work toward the same goal—what is best for the child. With God as the leader, this is a team that can and will succeed.

The first item to decide when planning for your child's conference is to determine the attendees.

You and the teacher will determine whether or not your child attends. The older the child, the more important it is for that child to take part in self-evaluation. If your child does not attend the conference, be sure to share the conference's discussions. Ideally, both parents should attend, but this is not always possible. Scheduling conferences with separated parents and blended families can get complicated. Quite often, a consensus must be reached regarding the child, and this happens most effectively if all the caregivers are involved in decision-making together. Please keep in mind that while these conferences involve the family, the concern is what is best for the child.

Conferences are short, usually 10 to 20 minutes of highly productive time. Prepare and come ready to ask and listen. Start your preparations by talking to your child. "What will your teacher have to tell me at conferences?" is a good open-ended question. You may need to prompt your child with more specific questions, so don't settle

for "I dunno." Ask your child to contribute to the list of questions to ask and issues to discuss. However, instead of merely creating a laundry list, pay attention to your child's words to gain insights into his or her perspective of what happens in the classroom. Your child's teacher can give you the "rest of the story," which will give you a more complete perspective. Parent-teacher conferences have long agendas to be accomplished in a short time. Your child's teacher should share information regarding your child's academic performance and classroom behavior. The teacher should be ready to address your concerns and to share concerns with you.

Assessing academic performance should involve two different types of assessment. When teachers share grades, homework, or classroom tests, they are sharing *product* evaluation. This gives you an idea of what your child knows and how well he or she performs in comparison to her peers. There is another type of evaluation that is just as important as product evaluation and that is *process* evaluation. It is important to know how much your child has progressed over time. For instance, a straight "A" student is doing very well in comparison to peers, but is he learning anything new? Likewise, a struggling student may have made excellent progress in learning new skills, but, because she doesn't test well, she still can have poor grades.

Classroom behavior and social skills development is an important part of the parent-teacher teamwork. If your child is doing well in this area, be sure to question further. Good classroom behavior may mean that your child is simply not speaking up. Social skill development can be hard to understand. You will want to make sure that your child feels comfortable working in groups, but does not dominate the group; that your child can speak up for himself with friends without manipulating or bullying. Basically, you want to know how well your child cooperates and works in groups, and how well your child compromises and negotiates with peers.

It is good to ask "Is my child generally happy at school?" and "How does my child handle stress?" These questions give a good picture of your child's emotional development. The most difficult part of parent/teacher conferences can be the handling of parent or teacher concerns regarding the student. This is when it's most important to remember the team aspect and to work from the mind-set that all involved bring their own expertise to

the table and have the best interests of the child at heart. Keep an open mind; just because you have not seen this behavior in your child before does not mean it can't be happening at school. Give your opinions gently but assertively to avoid creating a defensive mood. Ask what the teacher thinks you should do, as well as what the teacher plans to do. Make a clear goal of the change in behavior all of you want to see in your child and evaluate whether your plan of action will achieve that goal. Regardless of whether it is a homework, learning, attitude, or social skill issue, it is important to know the motivation behind the behavior you want to change.

It all boils down to a few things: taking an active part in your child's education, willingness to create a team, putting the best interests of the child before other considerations, and allowing the faith that God has given you, your child, and your child's teacher to lead your decision-making process.

Remember this promise of God:

"But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matt. 6:33)

- Our first mid-quarter progress reports will be issued to all students on October 6. Students still have five more weeks to improve these grades.
- We have three students involved in instrumental band. They practice twice each week under the leadership of Ms. Lindsey Meyer of Valley Lutheran High School.

- School pictures will be taken by a new company, Geskus Photography October 20.
- Our teachers will soon examine some new Christmas programs and as soon as we decide, it will be ordered, and we will begin practicing it.
- As a reminder, in case of emergency we are equipped with an Automatic External Defibrillator. It is located in the main school hallway on the north wall. It can easily be accessed for use in the church, school, gym, or playground.
- October 29 and 30, classes will not be in session as our teachers will be attending the MANS (Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools) conference in Detroit.

JUNIOR HIGH HIGHLIGHTS

The year has begun, and our teens are adjusting to the year. Much introductory material has been reviewed, and a regular schedule and routine has begun. Religion examines the New Testament Gospels, the "Good News" that Jesus loves us, forgives us, and is preparing a place for us in heaven. Pastor Reed is focusing on the doctrinal aspects of our church as he instructs the students in Confirmation four days each week. We started our American history lessons at the early 1700s. We are currently studying the American Revolution. A truly exciting time, as this was the time of the birth of our free country. Life science explores the cell, the basic structure of all living things. We will investigate the make up of cells and see

how plant and animal cells differ. Pictured, are Morgan, Melissa and Laura who have produced their own wet mount slide and are examining it under the microscope. Nouns and pronouns are the area of emphasis in our English series, with both grades looking at their proper use and placement within a sentence. In the area of math, we are progressing at a nice rate. The sixth and seventh grades are working on our first unit, which reviews addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers and fractions. The eighth grade will begin exploring

rational numbers. They will learn the four basic operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division as they apply to integers and rational numbers.

Our schedule is into full swing now as we have all our ducks in a row with the alterations we made this year. Students are coming and going as we utilize every moment and personnel to the finest.

My new 3rd graders are making such a wonderful transition into the world of "Mr. Gledhill". It is, no doubt, a change for them having been used to Miss Rudick for 3 years. But I see the benefit of her honing them. (Thank you Miss Rudick©)

Likewise, the 4th and 5th graders also needed to make the graduation from their previous grades respectively. I see a smooth, yet full year of intellectual advancements, and explorative discoveries.

We began our Science unit dis-

cussing weather and land formations. We created a river, a delta, witnessed erosion, and sediment deposit. Many students have been on, in or at a river. But it is so rewarding watching them put their new-found knowledge in connection with their memories of what they once saw.

The Science kits are in route. I am excited to see what discoveries the students make with those. More to come as that approaches.

The Social Studies curriculum, being consistent with 3rd grade Michigan Standards, is introducing communities. We are learning about cultures and customs within different ethnic groups that may comprise a community. We are moving into "Getting along in a Commu-

As we push forth, let us pray continually for our students, our staff, our church and our school.

dents even let it crawl on their hands!

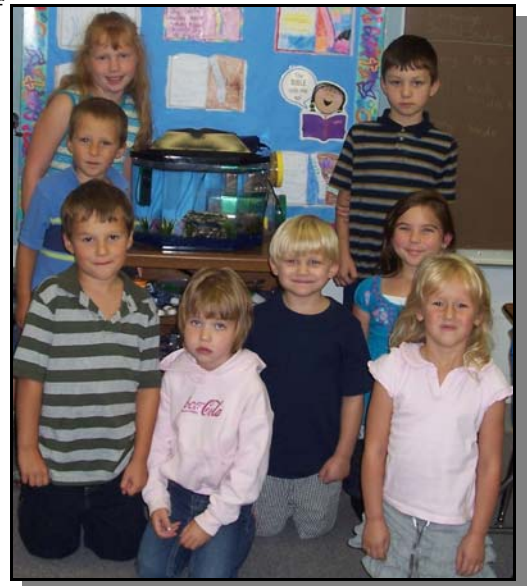
In Social Studies we are studying how schools are alike and different. We will also be learning about schools in the past and how they are alike and different from our schools now.

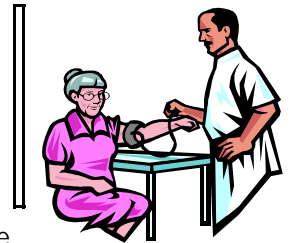
