## JESUS ASCENDED

On his way to the cross, our Lord had already spoken to his Father concerning his apostles. He had prayed that they be kept in the Father's Name, that they be continually sanctified by his Word, and that, as Jesus is One with the Father, so his apostles, too, be kept in oneness with the Father and with one another.

Then Jesus praised the same thing for us:

**I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me.”** John 17:20-21

"... Those who will have faith in me through their word," — that's us: our families and our children.

It's Easter. We've already heard not only of our Lord's death to atone for the sins of the world, but also of His resurrection from the dead. Now, toward the end of the Easter season, the church hears of her Lord's ascension to the throne in heaven.

So why would we now hear this most comforting prayer Jesus prayed to his Father right before his crucifixion, at the end of the Easter season, as Jesus is Ascended?

Because, he is, after all, ascended! Being seated at the right hand of the Father, he sends forth the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit continues gathering his church through the preaching of the Gospel, through the cleansing of Baptism, and through the sanctifying Body and Blood given out in the church. And as Jesus is dwelling in his church in the Word and Sacraments, he is also seated at the right hand of the Father in heaven. And there, in heaven, ascended overall, we know what he's doing.

He is praying. He is interceding to his Father for his church, for us, for our families, and for the world. He is petitioning his Father on our behalf, with words always heard by the Father. That's what we are given in our Lord's great prayer of John 17.

Jesus, seated at the right hand of the Father, is praying for his church, that she would be kept in his Father's Name, sanctified by his Word. He is praying for us, that we be kept in his Father's holy Name, sustained in his Word, and hearing his Word with ears of faith, we would be One with him as he is One with his Father. He is praying that, in him, we would be One with each other, forgiving one another, building one another up in the Gospel, comforting and encouraging one another, rejoicing in his gift of oneness.

It is this prayer, this intercession of Jesus to his Father that sustains us. By his voice the Holy Spirit is sent forth to the church, the Gospel is continually preached, his Body and Blood are continually feeding his church on earth. It is by this prayer, from Jesus to his Father, that we are sanctified and kept in oneness with him.

It is all by the prayer of Jesus. He is interceding for his church, for us, for all our brothers and sisters in the faith throughout the world, and he is praying for the world.



For those who now reject him, for those who bow down to other gods, for those who want to be their own gods, for those who are locked in hatred and retribution, he prays for that world:

**“I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. The glory that you have given me I have given to them, that they may be one even as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may become perfectly one, so that the world may know that you sent me and loved them even as you loved me.”**

He prays that the world would know that he has been sent forth from the Father to atone for the sins of the world.

And now the Church prays. We pray for the world, knowing that the Father in heaven hears our every prayer.

# Social networking sites: easy, fun, but safety—and limits—are musts

As we head into the summer, our children will have more free time and they will spend some of that time on the Internet. Today's children cannot imagine a life without Google, and connecting with friends via the World Wide Web is just second nature to them. Just as we wouldn't consider sending them on their bicycles without protection and safety guidelines we also need to prepare them for safe surfing on the computer.

Social networking sites allow each member to have a Web page, update that page, and control who sees what's posted. They are a fun way to communicate with others and connect with friends who live far away. For adults, they are an easy way to connect with people from your past. For everyone, they are a way to share what happens in your life and show a bit of your personality.

For children, computer time should not replace time spent with people. Important emotional development happens when children interact with each other and with adults. This does not happen as well through a computer screen. There also are risks of cyber bullying on social networking sites. It is a good idea to closely monitor the messages your child sends and receives, just as you would monitor friendships. Social networking sites can also give a false sense of security. You do have some measure of control over who sees your site and what information is available. However, these sites are not foolproof. They give the same illusion of security as credit cards. When used sensibly, they are safe. When safety is ignored, the results can be devastating. Monitor your child's use

of social networking sites.

Networking sites are fun and a source of entertainment that involves reading and writing. Working with them involves thinking, planning, and some level of creativity, which are skills that transfer to other learning.

Social networking sites are not recommended for children under the age of 11 or 12. Children this age are in strong need of face-to-face time with peers and should spend limited time in front of the computer, which hinders many necessary thinking skills. A family account handled by parents could be a compromise for children this age, who really feel the need to communicate with friends this way.

Middle school-age children, with healthy social skills, may be ready for a social network account. Monitor and limit time spent on the computer. Do not allow social networking to replace real-time contact with friends or adults. Here are some recommendations:

- Never reveal information like age, gender, birth date, phone numbers, address, e-mail addresses, social security numbers, and the school or church your child attends on a social network site or in a chat room.
- On a social network site, others "ask" to be your friend and do not have access to your site until you grant it. It can, however, be a game for children to see how many "friends" they can collect. This can cause them to be casual about people they add to their list. Your child should have your permission to add a friend, or to be added as a friend, and should not connect with people she has not already met face to face.
- Parents should have their own account and be on their child's friend list so they can check often and monitor what goes up on the site. Be aware that your child can easily set up a second account.
- After you have experimented with the

social network account, it is time to set up rules and guidelines about what your child will be able to use. There are many different groups and applications. Many are harmless fun, others lead to objectionable material.

- When you find objectionable material, or when friends make inappropriate comments, you have a great opportunity to teach your child how to discern. In some cases you may need to "unfriend" someone; in other cases, you and your child might find a way to respond with a gentle witness to faith and values.
- Help your child understand that social network sites are not good ways to resolve conflict. While teenagers are famous for sarcastic comments, expressing anger over the behavior of another person by making comments on your site is inappropriate, ineffective, and rude. Teach your child that conflicts need to be resolved face-to-face.
- As your child begins to decorate his or her site with photos or other applications, you have another good opportunity to teach about expressing the values of your shared faith. If you wouldn't want your grandparents to see the picture, then it probably shouldn't go up on your site.
- Social network sites give your child a new freedom, which comes with new responsibility. An account can be a great way for your child to show how well he or she makes decisions around friends. Or it can be a great way for your child to show how well he or she makes decisions regarding self-expression. If the freedom is abused, then it is best to put restrictions into place. When freedom is used carefully, lift the restrictions.
- Don't let social networking, chat rooms, or instant messaging become your child's whole life. Playing games and communicating on the computer can be fun, but children of all ages need physical activity and live interaction in order to grow and develop. If the computer takes all of your child's free time, you will need to impose restrictions and make suggestions for other activities.

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"You shall teach them to your children, talking of them when you are sitting in your house, and when you are walking by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise." (Deut. 11:19)

Teaching our children about God's love and God's will is a 24/7 job. We can share our faith with our children when we pray with them, in church, during devotions, and with discipline. We have the opportunity and responsibility to teach our children about the faith God gave them, even when using modern technology. Just as our heavenly Father patiently teaches us, He blesses us with the wisdom to share His Word with our children. A world with computers may be a little bit more complicated, but even a social networking site is an opportunity to share the love of God.

Special Person's Day is scheduled for May 27th, beginning at 10:00 a.m. We will begin with a worship service, followed by

classroom visitation. After a delicious luncheon, our guests will be treated to an all school performance of "Go, Go Jonah". There will be an additional presentation of the musical in the evening. May 28th, the entire school will travel to Zion, Beaver and join them and Trinity, Monitor for an old fashioned "Field Day". Lunch will be provided. Our goal is to build fellowship between our neighboring Lutheran schools.

As the year winds down there are certainly no end to many calendar items that need special attention. The annual music festival for grades 3 – 8 will be held at Zion, Bay City of May 7th. Miss Rudick will guide all participants in this choral and instrumental event. Upon completion of their event, they will be allowed to go home. Non-participating students will have class as usual with Mrs. Arnold, Mr. Gledhill, and Mr. Fredrich.

Memorial Day is May 31st and there will be no classes in session. The last day of school will be June 4th. Both June 3rd and 4th will be half days with a noon dismissal. Thursday is a half day so that the teachers can tabulate, average, and record all grades. Report cards will be distributed on the last day of school to all students. All tuition and registration payments must be made before your child receives their final report card. Pastor Reed will close our school year with a special chapel worship. Graduation Day has been set for June 6th after the combined 9:00 a.m. church service. We are graduating four eighth graders. The graduates are: Laura Clare, Abbie Hockemeyer, Travis McNally, and Melissa Vennix. The class valedictorian and salutatorian have not yet been determined.

But all is well, as they take it in strides of comprehension. The 3<sup>rd</sup> graders are taking a lesson-by-lesson introduction to various forms of measurement. As a side note, we the teachers are already beginning to fill in the minor details to accomplish the smoothest changes possible for next year. I am so excited to watch all of this come together. God will continue to bless this place, and those who serve and learn within.

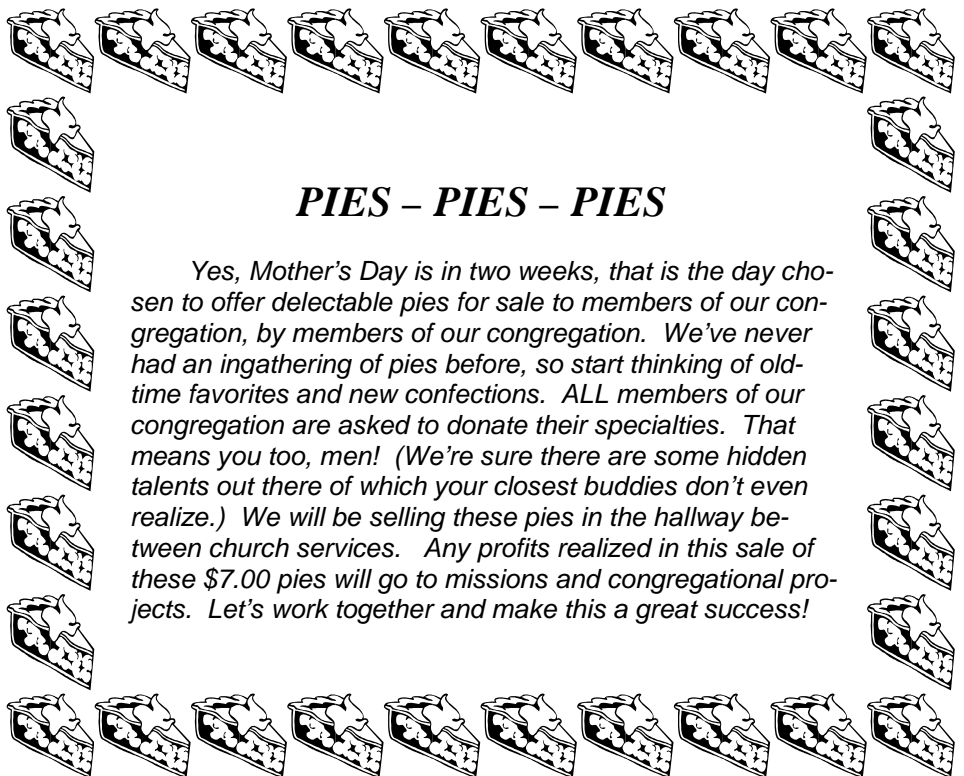

## Deficit Drive

Dear members of Grace Lutheran:

It was suggested at the February voters meeting that we have a debt reduction drive. While we do still owe \$94,000 on our mortgage, our problem is that our current bills are not being fully paid. So, instead of having a mortgage "debt" drive, the Finance Board with the support of the Executive Board is implementing a "deficit" drive. Here's how it works. First, we are asking every family to fully recognize the blessings they receive on a daily basis from our Lord and Savior. Maybe we aren't always aware of these blessings or perhaps we just tend to forget how fortunate we are. In recognition of these blessings we are asking each individual to do some soul searching to help us in this deficit drive. Secondly, we are asking every individual/family to increase their monthly tithing "ABOVE AND BEYOND" your normal contributions by either \$20, \$40, \$60, \$80 or \$100 a month for the next twelve months. If your financial situation is such that you cannot participate at this time, that is fully understandable. There will be commitment cards placed in your mail box for you to complete and turn in to the collection plate. There will not be a place for your name or envelope number. This is strictly a commitment between you and your God. We will periodically display a chart in the Narthex indicating the number of families participating and at what dollar amount they have committed to. We pray the Holy Spirit works faith in your decision.
